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Head Start | Early Head Start Divison

Head Start (HS)

Head Start prepares our community's most vulnerable young children to succeed in school and in life beyond school. Our program takes a two-generation approach, focusing on building strong parent and child relationships with an overall child goal of increasing school readiness skills. We deliver services to children and families in core areas of early learning, health, and family well-being, while engaging parents as partners every step of the way.

In 2021, we served 333 children aged 3 to 5 years old and their families at our center-based locations and through our Home Based programs.

We have programs in Licking, Delaware, and Union Counties.

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Early Head Start (EHS)

Designed to nurture healthy attachments between parent and child, the Early Head Start program serves infants, toddlers, and pregnant women through one-on-one weekly home visits. We help support expectant families to prepare for the upcoming new family member through a comprehensive approach that focuses on development, nutrition, health, mental health and education.

In 2021, Early Head Start served 128 infants and toddlers, and 10 pregnant women.

Freshly Prepared Meals for Children

Proper nutrition is fundamental for children to grow and develop in a healthy manner.

LEADS operates two professional-level kitchens in order to provide meals for Head Start center-based children. All meals are high in nutrition and low in fats, sugars, and salts, with whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables used as much as possible.

These meals are prepared by Serve Safe Certified cooks 5 days a week and delivered by staff to each of our Head Start center locations. We have kitchens in our Administrative Office in Newark and at our Marysville location.

Funding for Head Start and Early Head Start is provided by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. The U.S. Department of Agriculture provides reimbursement through the Child & Adult Food Program for meals served to children throughout the year.

PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Food Service

During the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) fiscal year, October 2020 through September 2021, LEADS' two kitchens provided:

- 80,556 total meals
- 26,496 snacks
- 26,988 breakfasts
- 20,072 lunches
- 4,287.5 gallons of milk

The reimbursement through CACFP:

\$ 102,608.03 total food expenses | \$ 7,2490.98 non-food expenses

Serving Children with Disabilities

Of the 471 children and families served, 69 had an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) through their local education agency or education service center. Eighteen families had an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP) through their local early intervention agency.

These numbers reflect we exceeded our mandate of having 10% of our enrollment serving children with diagnosed disabilities.

Providing Services to Incarcerated Women with Infants

Early Head Start (EHS) provided services to 6 mothers and their infants at the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW). The program assists the mothers by connecting them to services and programs for a successful return to society.

Serving Pregnant Women

A total of 10 pregnant women were provided EHS services during the 2020-2021 program year. 9 of these families continued enrollment after the newborn arrived. Each family is provided a newborn home visit and receives gift packages from Newborns in Need.

Family Engagement

- 470 Head Start and Early Head Start families received a wide variety of parent education and training services, including:
- Health and safety
- Nutrition
- · Positive parenting
- · Economic mobility
- Mental health
- Advocacy, child development and community supports during the pandemic
- Chromebooks were provided for families in need to support virtual learning and communication during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- More than 60 families planned and attended virtual family and father events during the program year.
- 26 parent/guardians volunteered as members of the Head Start/Early Head Start Policy Council and PART (Parent Activities Resource Team)

All 5 Head Start Centers earned a 5-star quality rating, Step Up to Quality (SUTQ), awarded by the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services.

Child Development

Outcomes show that in EHS/HS, the percentages of children that met or exceeded agency benchmarks for school readiness goals were:

Health

- 82% of EHS/HS children are up-to-date on all preventative primary health care
- 57% of children diagnosed with a chronic health condition received/completed treatment
- 80% of HS have continuous and accessible professional dental care



COMMUNITY SERVICES DIVISION

Energy Efficiency

91 households received energy efficiency improvements such as:

- New furnaces
- Home insulation
- High efficiency lighting
- Air sealing to reduce drafts and energy loss
- Home repair and improvement

124 households received home construction projects such as:

- New roofs
- Wheelchair ramps
- Handicapped-accessible bathrooms
- Other emergency repairs

Emergency Services Division

- 7,607 households received assistance with utility payments
- 728 utility disconnects were prevented
- 6,116 energy assistance applications were processed

Home Relief

- 291 households received assistance
- \$863,440.35 in rent/deposit assistance provided
- \$51,034.47 in utility assistance provided
- \$194,179.31 in mortgage assistance provided

Food Pantries / Food Assistance

LEADS operates food pantries in Buckeye Lake, Pataskala, and Utica. Families and individuals must apply to access these pantries. We obtain food supplies from a number of different resources, including donations from businesses, churches, groups/clubs, and individuals, as well as from the Food Pantry Network of Licking County.

- 4,321 households received food from the pantries
- 5,041 hours were volunteered for the pantries
- 880 households received food assistance through the COVID-19 Crisis Assistance Program

HOUSING SERVICES

LEADS Housing Division is an experienced provider of affordable housing. To date, LEADS has participated in 40 housing developments ranging from 15 to 100 units. These developments are located in 22 counties throughout Ohio. Prospective residents must qualify under various income, credit and background guidelines for each of the programs that finance the property. Funding is provided through Low Income Housing Tax Credits, USDA Rural Development, and the US Dept. of Housing and Urban Development.

- 1,201 households were provided with affordable housing
- Occupancy rate was 95%
- 276 monthly financial statements were submitted by the management companies to LEADS' Asset Management Director
- 34 properties had audits and tax returns reviewed and approved
- 16 site visits were performed in 2021 via virtual, desktop reviews, or in-person visits



Turning Hardship, Determination, and Empathy into a New Career



She had been volunteering at a food pantry in the meantime, and even offered to volunteer at a LEADS pantry. The staff asked her about her past employment, education, and what type of job she was looking for.


