These words describe the strength, sincerity, and scope of the work LEADS does in order to empower people in greatest need. Customers striving to care for themselves while dealing with personal crises, economic volatility, and significant national challenges, find a lifeline at LEADS. With services ranging from Early Head Start/Head Start family support, to providing affordable housing, to assisting with home quality improvement, to emergency services and food distribution, LEADS is there. As a Community Action Agency, it has worked for decades improving quality of life for individuals, while developing a strong network with other agencies to promote efficient use of resources for its customers. LEADS' unique structure promotes outreach to multiple communities in multiple counties.

LEADS was incorporated 2 years after the signing of the Economic Opportunity Act in 1964. At that time, the national poverty rate was around 19%. The latest census figures, from 2023, report it is around 11%. LEADS' exceptionally skilled and devoted staff now, and over the years, have been instrumental in lowering the poverty rate by empowering its customers. More work is needed. So, LEADS' staff continue being courageous and devoted, rolling up their sleeves and opening their hearts.

Head Start prepares our community's most vulnerable young children to succeed in school and in life beyond school.



Head Start (HS)

Head Start prepares our community's most vulnerable young children to succeed in school and in life beyond school. Our program takes a two-generation approach, focusing on building strong parent and child relationships with an overall goal of increasing the child's school readiness skills. We deliver services to children and families in core areas of early learning, health, and family well-being, while engaging parents as partners every step of the way.

During the 2023-24 school year, we served **349** children aged three-to-five-years old and their families at our center-based locations and through our home-based programs. We have programs in Licking, Delaware, and Union Counties.

Early Head Start (EHS)

Designed to nurture healthy attachments between parent and child, the Early Head Start program serves infants, toddlers, and pregnant women through one-on-one weekly home visits. We support expectant families as they prepare for the upcoming new family member through a comprehensive approach that focuses on development, nutrition, health, mental health, and education.

During the 2023-24 school year, Early Head Start served **120** infants and toddlers, and **6** pregnant women.



Freshly Prepared Meals for Children

Proper nutrition is fundamental for children to grow and develop in a healthy manner.

LEADS HS/EHS operates licensed kitchens at our Newark and Marysville facilities. The program is proud that all breakfast, lunch and snacks are prepared by Nutrition Staff who are ServSafe-Certified through the County Health Departments. The meals contain required components such as grain, vegetable, fruit, meat and fluid milk. We also prepare individual meals for children who may have food intolerances/allergies as well as religious and cultural food requests. As our program utilizes resources from the USDA's CACFP program, we not only prepare healthy foods but we are able to provide parent education for the families.





HEAD START | EARLY HEAD START PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Food Service

During the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) fiscal year, October 2023 through September 2024, LEADS' two kitchens provided:

- 66,380 total meals
- 22,496 breakfasts
- 23,067 lunches
- **29,817** snacks
- · 3,064 gallons of milk

The reimbursement through CACFP:

\$ 110,829.99 total food expenses

\$ 15,200.39 non-food expenses

Serving Children with Disabilities

Of the **469** children served, **51** had an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) through their local education agency or education service center. Nine families had an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP) through their local early intervention agency.

These numbers reflect that we exceeded our mandate of having 10% of our enrollment serving children with diagnosed disabilities.

Providing Services to Incarcerated Women with Infants

Early Head Start (EHS) provided services to **10** incarcerated mothers with infants at the Ohio Reformatory for Women (ORW). The program assists the mothers by connecting them to services and programs for a successful return to society.



Serving Pregnant Women

A total of **6** pregnant women were provided EHS services during the 2023-24 program year; of these families, **6** continued enrollment after the newborn arrived.

Each family is provided a newborn home visit and receives gift packages from Newborns in Need.



All LEADS Head Start Centers earned a quality rating through the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, Step Up to Quality (SUTQ).

Family Engagement

Head Start and Early Head Start families received a wide variety of parent education and training services, including:

- Health and safety
- Nutrition
- Positive parenting
- Economic mobility
- · Mental health
- More than 173 families planned and attended virtual family and father events during the program year.
- 24 parent/guardians volunteered as members of the Head Start/Early Head Start Policy Council and PART (Parent Activities Resource Team)







COMMUNITY SERVICES DIVISION

Child Development

Outcomes show that in EHS/HS, the percentages of children that met or exceeded agency benchmarks for school readiness goals were:

Health

- **89%** of EHS/HS children are up-to-date on all preventative primary health care
- **79%** of children diagnosed with a chronic health condition received/completed treatment
- 72% of HS have continuous and accessible professional dental care

Energy Efficiency

80 households received energy efficiency improvements such as:

- New furnaces
- Home insulation
- · High efficiency lighting
- · Air sealing to reduce drafts and energy loss
- · Home repair and improvement

129 households received health and safety improvements within their home, such as:

- Lead, radon, carbon monoxide & fire hazard reduction
- Disability accessibility modifications

154 households received essential home repairs or modifications such as:

- Electrical and plumbing repairs
- HVAC and A/C
- Minor roof repairs
- Other essential repairs
- Handicap accessibility modifications such as: wheelchair ramps, grab bars and railings

EMERGENCY SERVICES DIVISION

17 households avoided eviction

6,747 households participated in utility assistance programs

Food Pantries / Food Assistance

LEADS operates food pantries in Buckeye Lake, Pataskala, and Utica. We obtain food supplies from a number of different resources, including donations from businesses, churches, groups/clubs, and individuals, as well as from the Food Pantry Network of Licking County.

- 1,398 eligible individuals/households received food from the pantries
- 1,107 eligible individuals/households received senior food boxes





AFFORDABLE HOUSING

LEADS continues to be a leader in affordable housing development and management in Ohio. To date, the organization has participated in **40** housing developments totaling **1,476** units across **22** counties.

Funding Sources:

- Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC)
- USDA Rural Development
- HUD

All tenants must meet eligibility based on income, credit, and background checks per funding program requirements.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

Brookside Place Apartments (Pataskala, OH)

Awarded 2024 LIHTC funding for a \$7M+ rehabilitation. Updates include modern kitchens/baths, energy-efficient systems, new windows, siding, and roof. Originally developed in 1994; now entering a new LIHTC cycle with Ohio Capital Corporation for Housing as the syndicator.

2024 OUTCOMES

- 1,151 households housed in safe, affordable units
- 95% average occupancy rate






2024 REVENUE \$ 10,131,759
